ANDOVER VISION

The Council, community groups and residents across Andover re-launched the Andover Vision initiative earlier this year to create a long-term vision for the town. This exciting new project revolves around Andover's community and will create a 20 year plan to help raise aspiration and ambition across the town.

Andover Vision began with a 10-year plan back in 2005, which delivered a number of projects in the town including a cinema, The Lights theatre and the Junior Graduation ceremonies. The Vision was a success: it met its aims and objectives and now is the perfect time to renew the ambitions for the next 20 years. During the past few months, Andover Vision has been consulting with residents, community groups and organisations to find out their hopes and aspirations for the town and to discuss how we can work together to achieve them.

In April 2016, approximately 70 people attended the Andover Vision re-launch community event, and contributed their ideas and thoughts on the big issues

that a new vision should consider. Following this event, six themed working groups have met over the summer months looking at subjects such as: raising aspirations; vibrant community; High Street and town centre; jobs, business and enterprise; green spaces and the environment, and good health. The outcomes from the working groups have since formed the basis of a number of public consultation events across the town.

Residents may remember seeing the Andover Vision team at the town's carnival earlier this year. More than 250 local people visited the stall in Vigo Road Recreation Ground to share their thoughts on the Vision's themes as well as their hopes for the future of the town. Andover Vision also teamed up with the Council's Four Fun Fridays project, which took place every Friday in August in the High Street, to speak to even more people about the themes. So far, more than 1,000 people have given their views and ideas through the various activities and events. A new Vision is expected to be launched in April 2017.

LAUNCHES VISION DOCUMENT FOR THE TOWN



Romsey Future has launched a new document setting out the vision for Romsey for the next 20 years.

The partnership collated the numerous ideas it gathered from extensive public consultation, and launched its first vision document at Crosfield Hall in June this year. The vision document sets out exciting new ambitions, including increasing tourism in the town, improving walking and cycling facilities, managing infrastructure, developing flood defences, enhancing health and wellbeing opportunities and encouraging community involvement in planning policies.

The Romsey Future partnership is made up of representatives from local community groups and organisations from across the town. Since the partnership launched back in November 2013, residents have voted on projects and spoken to members of working groups to share their ideas

Romsey Future has already achieved

many of its short-term aims. For example, the partnership helped to secure a government grant of £10,000 to set up the Romsey Rendezvous community café. The café is a popular amenity which offers information, support and advice to local residents. The partnership has also enabled the town to host a Teenage Market where young local people can trade, and supported Test Valley Borough Council to adopt Fishlake Meadows as a nature reserve for residents and visitors to enjoy.

Councillor Martin Hatley, who has been coordinating the Romsey Future project, said: "Romsey Future is now at a really exciting stage. We've carried out extensive consultation and we've written the vision based on what local people want for the town. I am looking forward to continuing the great work undertaken so far."

New arch unveiled for **George Yard**

The first Andover arch, which will signpost shoppers to the businesses located off the High Street, was unveiled by Mayor of Test Valley, Councillor Karen Hamilton, on 31 August.

Local businesses, councillors and Council staff gathered to watch the official opening of the new George Yard arch, which has been designed by renowned artist, Peter Clutterbuck.

The idea to enhance signage for the shops along the seven lanes off the High Street came from feedback from the Andover Summit and Encounters initiative, which aimed to rejuvenate the town centre and increase footfall. This work now continues through the renewed Andover Vision. The remaining six arches are planned for Union Street, Waterloo Court, Shaw's Walk, Globe Yard, King's Yard and Black Swan Yard.

Peter's previous work includes the War Memorial Park gate and town entrance sign in Hedge End, the bandstand in Southsea and Falklands memorial arch in Fareham, as well as a wide range of other projects.



Peter said: "We have thoroughly enjoyed working on this project and look forward to starting work on the remaining arches. It is great when you finally get to see pieces finished and in place."

Leader of the Council, Councillor lan Carr, said: "I am delighted that the first Andover arch is now in place. We are really lucky to have some fantastic businesses located just off the High Street and the new arches will help to signpost people to them. I would like to thank Peter Clutterbuck and his team, the local businesses and all those involved in the arches project for their hard work to deliver this first arch at George Yard."

Green Flag Awards for Test Valley parks

Romsey War Memorial Park has now won an impressive nine consecutive Green Flag Awards. Rooksbury Mill has won the award for eight consecutive years, while the announcement confirms that Valley Park Woodlands can celebrate its seventh consecutive success.

The park and local nature reserves are among a record-breaking 1,686 parks and green spaces that received a prestigious Green Flag Award this year. The award recognises and rewards the best parks and green spaces across the country. A green flag or sign is a symbol to the public that the space boasts the highest possible standards, is beautifully maintained and has excellent facilities.

Community and Leisure Portfolio Holder, Councillor Tony Ward, said: "We are delighted that our parks have received the Green Flag Awards again. The awards are testament to the hard work that goes into the upkeep of the areas. I'm really pleased that residents and visitors can enjoy such fantastic green spaces in Test Valley."

A step back in time



Andover has a long and fascinating history, but how much do local people really know about their town?

Test Valley Borough Council has added an extra dimension to Andover's heritage by re-launching its Heritage Trail. Residents and visitors are now able to step back in time and re-live the town's history by reading and listening to facts about the area's historic places of interest.

Actors from the Theatre of Dark Encounters brought the trail to life on four days in August by dressing in period costumes and sharing stories about how England's peace with the Vikings was secured, how a scandal in the town's workhouse led to the reform of the Poor Laws and how the arrival of the railways affected people living and working in the town. Soon, school children will enjoy learning about Andover's history by taking part in interactive workshops inspired by elements of the trail.

Household waste - your duty of care

Did you know? Householders are required by law to check that anyone removing waste from their property is authorised to do so. The most common requirement is the waste carriers licence, which is usually needed for building and allied trades, landscape gardeners, tree fellers and surgeons, house clearers and scrap metal dealers.

Social media is a popular way to advertise waste removal services, so if you choose a private contractor you've seen online, we recommend the following:

 Ensure that they are a registered waste carrier. It is also a good idea to make a note of the contractor's waste carrier number. If they claim to be registered but do not have any paperwork, you can telephone the Environment Agency on 03708 506506, or visit the Environment Agency website, to request an instant waste carrier validation check. If you find that your contractor is not registered, you should refuse their service.

- Check where your contractor is proposing to take your waste.
- Make a note of the registration number of any vehicle removing waste from your home.
- Pay by cheque if you can. This
 means that payments can be traced
 if the waste is fly-tipped. If your
 contractor insists on cash, you
 should refuse their service.
- Request a receipt for the work carried out.

You could be fined up to £5,000 if your waste has been fly-tipped, even if you think an authorised carrier has disposed of your waste. Please take reasonable measures to ensure that your waste is disposed of responsibly.

Will your house be warm and cosy this winter?

Keeping your home warm and your family healthy can be expensive and sometimes difficult, but Hampshire's Hitting the Cold Spots team will help you to keep warm at home and reduce your energy bills.

Now in its sixth year, Hitting the Cold Spots offers practical advice and details of local services that can help vulnerable residents manage the cost of their heating. The scheme is delivered in partnership with Hampshire County Council and has helped hundreds of vulnerable people to access affordable warmth.

Hitting the Cold spots advisors can provide information about accessing funding, boiler repairs and replacements and emergency heating. They can also visit residents in their homes to assess their needs.

Are your details up to date?

Test Valley Borough Council wrote to all households in August to ask homeowners to check whether the information that appears on the electoral register regarding residents living at that address is correct. The Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) selected a Test Valley housing development as a finalist in the Sustainable Buildings category of its Countryside Awards.

Ringbourne Copse in Barton Stacey consists of 19 dwellings, seven of which are affordable homes. The builders, Bargate Homes, used natural products, such as oak, for the window frames and doors, and installed energy-saving

lighting systems, water-saving devices, compost bins and other facilities in the homes to encourage sustainable living.

The Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire announced the winner at the Countryside Awards ceremony on 15 September and although Ringbourne Copse didn't take the top spot, the project received lots of positive feedback from the judges and other finalists.

Community Infrastructure Levy

Since 1 August 2016, new large retail stores and certain types of housing development have been required to pay the Community Infrastructure Levy.

The Levy is a new way of ensuring that developers make financial contributions to infrastructure such as roads, flood defences, schools and local amenities.

The amount of the Levy varies, depending on the site's location, type and size. The Council will give a proportion of the Levy to Parish Councils to spend on local infrastructure.

This proved to be very popular and went on to win the public vote. Table tennis is a great activity for people of all ages to enjoy, so I hope the tables will be well used by the public.

"Andover Vision is about establishing our residents' hopes and aspirations for the town and I am delighted that we have been able to deliver this initial project for them. Ultimately, the plan is to create a long term vision for the town, but we hope to deliver small, one-off projects along the way."

Feedback from residents will be used to develop an Andover Vision document and action plan, which are expected to be launched in April 2017.
