


TOP TIP!

When you visit the delightful King John's House you can find architectural clues to the origins and use of an enigmatic and fascinating medieval building with its adjoining Tudor Cottage. On our daily guided tour you can hear stories of the people who lived and worked in and around the buildings as they slowly descended from high status to the very poorest of Romsey's housing, See a rare animal bone floor and 14th-Century graffiti etched at dagger point into original decorated medieval plaster. Discover connections with Royalty and Religion and explore the Museum telling the story of the Moody family, once owners of the House and Cottage, King John's House is set in a secluded period-style garden, creating an attractive backdrop to the delightful Miss Moody's Tudor Tea Room serving homemade lunches, cake and traditional afternoon teas.

Connecting with the past

Test Valley's long and fascinating heritage attracts visitors from far and wide, it is a destination steeped in captivating stories of times gone by. Test Valley also enjoys iconic links to a vast literary history that can be discovered throughout the district.

From Thomas the Tank Engine[™] to James Bond, Test Valley's rich history includes an abundance of relationships to famous characters and settings from some of the most well-known books of all time. Immerse yourself in surroundings that have inspired several lifetimes of literary genius and walk the pages of novels, children's books, and cartoons.

Your visit will bring you closer to an abundance of historic architecture. Romsey Abbey is one of the finest examples of Norman architecture in southern England, and the county boasts more Iron Age hill forts than anywhere else in Hampshire, including Danebury Iron Age Hill Fort. There are also 6 watermills in Andover that date back to the Domesday Book.

Discover 750 years of history at King John's House and Museum, and Andover Museum uncovers

the town's fascinating past and the events and tales that put it on the map.

Discover stories of creativity and conflict, love and loss at Mottisfont Abbey house and gardens. Now a National Trust property, this former medieval priory became the place for artists to come and relax to create spectacular works of art. Whitchurch Silk Mill is part of Test Valley's industrial heritage, a working museum still using original Victorian machinery, including a number of power looms. The region's history doesn't end at ground level as the Army Flying Museum in Middle Wallop celebrates the lives of the British Army's soldiers in the air.

And your historic journey wouldn't be complete without visiting the final resting place of Florence Nightingale. The small church of St Margaret's in East Wellow, established in 1215 - the year of Magna Carta - is the perfect shrine to the memory of The Lady with the Lamp.







ARMY FLYING MUSEUM

Immerse yourself in the fascinating story of British Army flying by visiting one of Test Valley's hidden gems. The Army Flying Museum sits adjacent to the Army Air Corps Airfield at Middle Wallop, near Stockbridge. Pay once and receive free entry for a year.

Two large hangars house the impressive journey of British soldiers in the air from the pioneering days of balloons and kites to the Glider Pilot Regiments dropping at Arnhem, right through to modern helicopter operations. Often likened to the Tardis, there is a volume of artefacts, medals and over thirty five fixed wing and rotary aircraft on show. Imaginative displays with a clever use of interactives and video provide for fascinating



insight into the history of British Army flying.


Observe the dignified memorial to more than 5,000 that have died in the service of British Army

flying from early pioneers to modern Army Air Corps.

The newest 'Explore the Apache' interactive display offers visitors the chance to find out everything about this iconic aircraft through films, images, and audio recordings. For front row seats of these, and other aircraft, in action, look no further than the Museum's Apache Café.

The Army Flying Museum is open daily from 10am to 4.30pm (5.30pm July and August). The Museum is easily accessible from the M3 and A303 on the A343 between Salisbury and Andover. The Apache Café is also open daily from 9.00am to 4.00pm (5pm July and August) and Museum entry is not required to access the café.



Welcome to Romsey

The ancient market town of Romsey sits on the banks of the River Test. Florence Nightingale and the Reverend Wilbert Awdry, the creator of Thomas the Tank Engine, both lived in this timeless English market town. Pretty medieval streets surround the Abbey, which is one of the finest examples of Norman architecture in England.

Enjoy wandering among Romsey Market on Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays - with stalls situated in the Cornmarket and Market Place. Visit the Romsey Makers Market every Sunday plus on the first Sunday of the month, you can enjoy one of Hampshire's busiest Farmers' Markets and the opportunity to buy top quality products grown or made in the local area.



Market Place is a reminder of days gone by with the statue of Lord Palmerston, former Foreign Secretary, Prime Minister in the 1800s, and famous for his "gun boat diplomacy". The Victorian town hall first opened its doors in 1866. In Church Street you'll find King John's House and Museum with medieval, Tudor and Victorian buildings, rich in history and surrounded by a beautiful period-style garden.

Within this historic town there is an excellent range of shops, from small independents to high street names, as well as the family owned department store, Bradbeers.

ROMSEY SIGNAL BOX - A UNIQUE WORKING MUSEUM

Originally opened around 1870 and closed in 1982, the

box was saved and moved down to its own dedicated site. The Signal Box has been restored to operational order with various signals connected to some of the levers, which you are encouraged to pull. See demonstrations of the Signal Box in operation, and, if you are an enthusiast, you can operate it to a full timetable as if doing it for real. The site also features many other working exhibits, a small museum, café and toilet facilities.

The Signal Box is open to the public from 11am to 4pm on the first Sunday (February-December) and third Saturday (January-November) of the month. The site is also open to the public on special dates (see website for more details). A small entrance fee is charged for adults. Enquiries: 01794 500523

FUN IN THE GREAT OUTDOORS

If you're looking for some serious family fun, then Paultons Park is a great value family theme park with more than 70 wonderful rides and attractions. It is also home of Peppa Pig World, Lost Kingdom, Critter Creek, and Tornado Springs - a midwest experience.

Whether you are a novice rider or a galloping pro, the landscapes offer horse-riders many miles of bridleway through the tranquil scenery of Stockbridge Down, Chilbolton Common and Danebury Hill. There are many riding schools and stables offering superb equestrian facilities including five-star livery services, top-class tuition and horse trekking experiences perfect for those with a sense of adventure.

If you like to ride your bike then pedal your way around the stunning countryside and winding country roads. There are plenty of routes to choose from of varying length. So, whether it's a leisurely ride along the tranquil riverbank or an energetic ramble through Mottisfont on the Michelmersh Circular Walk, there's a route to suit. SOMETHING FOR UMBRELLA DAYS

If it's not quite the right weather to be spending the day outside then there's no need to worry. There are plenty of indoor attractions to keep you warm, dry and entertained! With special term time and school holiday activities at Andover Museum and Museum of the Iron Age, children will have fun tracing the history of Andover from prehistoric times to the present day, perfect for those inquisitive families.

The house at Mottisfont was originally founded as an Augustinian priory in 1201 and has a depth



of history to share. Discover extraordinary rooms and displays throughout that tell the story of this historic house. Once the rain has stopped you can enjoy it's beautiful surrounding gardens.

ANIMAL MAGIC

If the little ones want to get closer to animals, there is a world of fun at Finkley Down Farm. Activities run each day offering the chance to cuddle a rabbit, groom a pony, feed the goats or even get closer to reptiles. There are go-karts, mini ride-on tractors, sandpits and trampolines to burn off their energy and an indoor play barn for those inclement days. It's open all year round with a great diary of special events, so pack a picnic or choose to dine in the tearoom and enjoy the whole day here.

Another opportunity to get friendly with the animals is at Cholderton Charlie's Farm. Talk to the animals, feed them or just admire their unique characters. You can even adopt them! Appealing to all ages, there is a 500 foot long, 32-foot high treetop trail; tree house, zip-line and nest swing to let the kids go wild on.

If it's feathered friends you prefer, prepare yourselves for a truly unique day out at The Hawk Conservancy Trust. The award-winning visitor attraction offers a full day out for all ages with magnificent flying displays set to music.



As well as its breathtaking natural beauty, Test Valley outstanding gardens which are all unique, and well worth a visit.

Whether you are a keen, green-fingered gardener, someone who admires and enjoys the beauty of blooms, or are perhaps simply looking for somewhere stunning to walk – the gardens are waiting to be discovered, no matter the season. They offer plenty of wide open spaces, minimal crowds, and wholesome fresh air.


Take a picnic and enjoy lunch in the great outdoors amongst the gorgeous settings, the perfect mix of playing and relaxing. If you don't have time to make a picnic most of the gardens also have delicious cafes.

Visit the famous walled rose garden at National Trust property, Mottisfont Abbey, which includes more than 500 varieties of stunning roses. The picturesque grounds have much to excite visitors all year round, along with a jampacked programme of events and exhibitions.

Sir Harold Hillier Gardens offers 180 acres of open space and 42,000 plants from around the world. The award winning gardens specialises in horticulture, conservation, education and recreation. If you're visiting with children, they'll love climbing the tree house, crossing the wobbly bridge, and weaving through the bamboo tunnels.

The history of the site of King John's House's gardens can be traced back to the late 1530s where it has been transformed into a series of beautiful gardens by a group of dedicated volunteers to provide a welcoming oasis in the middle of Romsey. Pre-18th-Century plants flourish in the main garden, along with a Victorian terrace and a fountain courtyard.

Houghton Lodge Gardens near Stockbridge is a hidden gem and is recognised as one of the finest gardens in Hampshire. Enjoy the Walled Garden with stunning peony walk and rose arbour, themed herb garden and ancient orchard of fruit trees.

Discover activities that will get the heart-racing of the bravest adults, to family adventures that will have you talking about your experiences for a long time to come!

If you're a bit of a thrill-seeker you will love the famous motor racing circuit at Thruxton – the fastest race track in the UK. With the latest supercars and racing cars, a driving experience at Thruxton is a unique and memorable day out for any petrol head. You could be driving your

dream car on the UK's fastest race circuit or just enjoy spectating as the cars race past you.

Prefer two-wheels? With so many cycle routes around Test Valley, it's a great way to get the heart pumping while exploring the area. Luckily there are also plenty of cafes and pub stops on route to help you replenish yourself!

If it's a family challenge you're looking for, head to Golden Gecko Climbing, where the term "climbing the walls" has a much more fun-filled meaning! This indoor climbing centre in Romsey offers indoor climbing challenges for those new to climbing and the more experienced.





How about a bit of healthy family competition? Perfect your strike at Andover's Riverside Bowl or head to their Glo-Golf for a twist on mini golf and putt your way around the world from the Golden Gate Bridge to the Eiffel tower!

Dive to Romsey Rapids for a fun swim. After its million-pound makeover in 2019, do you dare to ride the rapids or the flume, and sail the high seas on its pirate ship? The family will certainly enjoy making a splash!

Of course, Paultons Park isn't all just gentle rides and Peppa Pig, it's full of heart-racing rides and rollercoasters. Tornado Springs was Paultons Park newest addition in 2021 and features 8 exciting rides, including Storm Chaser, a spinning rollercoaster that takes you 20 metres



off the ground before 'riding the storm', it's the only rollercoaster of it's kind in the UK so don't miss out while you're here.

With such an epic landscape, natural beauty, and depth of history, it's no surprise Test Valley is an inspiring place for artists and art lovers. Iconic paintings and tales of the Iron Age are re-lived on the walls of the many galleries that can be found in Test Valley.

HISTORICAL ARTS AND CULTURE

Mottisfont Abbey inspired a 1930s dream of creativity, where artists would come to relax and create works of art and it has been a place of inspiration to many artists ever since. It exhibits a substantial collection of 20th-century pieces and hosts a series of changing exhibitions.

A wonderful reminder of one of the oldest crafts is presented at Whitchurch Silk Mill. The oldest working silk mill in the UK, it continues to weave silk using 19th century machinery and highlights Test Valley's industrial heritage. Their Riverside Cafe offers scenic views alongside their seasonal menu, a perfect spot to relax amongst the cultural surroundings.

DISCOVER LOCAL ARTISTS

The Wykeham Gallery in Stockbridge displays works of well-known British and international artists, it's also a great place to discover young and emerging artists. Their extensive range of sculptures, ceramics, bronzes and glass can be found throughout their studio and gallery garden.

Watch the craftsmen at work at the Fairground Craft and Design Centre at Weyhill and discover a community that includes a papercraft shop, sustainable products shop, florist, furniture makers, yarn, fabric, and more! You'll also find plenty of opportunities to get creative with their regular workshops and classes. A wonderful place where you can get hands-on or simply soak up the creativity with a coffee in the tearoom.



The Lights in Andover is a cultural hub of activity offering a full professional programme of music, theatre, comedy and dance together with an arts-related education and training programme, community group performances, exhibitions and gigs, there is also a stylish cafe area and wine bar for you to enjoy.

Test Valley is renowned for producing delightful tipples, from full-bodied wines to the finest gin, and award-winning ales. Its sheltered slopes make it a haven for growing the "holy trinity" of Chardonnay, Pinot Meunier and Pinot Noir to make English sparkling wine, and the River Test is one of the purest chalk streams in England, offering crystal clear waters that make its riverbanks perfect for distilling.

FROM THE LOCAL VINE

If you have a nose for fine wine, love to sample the fresh botanicals of a delightful gin, or want to discover the flavour of the local brew, you've come to the right place!

Danebury Vineyard near Stockbridge, named after one of the most famous Iron Age hill forts in the country, covers seven acres of sheltered southfacing fields on chalk and flint soil and produces another award-winning sparkling and still white wine.

In Andover, Black Chalk Valley Vineyard uses oak barrels and time on lees to provide their wine with depth and complexity. The result is a fruit driven, perfectly balanced, crisp English sparkling wine.

If you prefer a glass of rosé on a hot summer's day, Somborne Valley Vineyard is for you. Lying on the Hoplands Estate outside Kings Somborne, it has become renowned for its rich, creamy sparkling and delicate still rosé.

You may recognise The Leckford Estate as it's owned by the John Lewis Partnership. It produces 57 tonnes of grapes from its 17,000 vines - enough to fill 37,000 bottles! The estate includes a farm shop, café and plant nursery, which you can explore.



Don't miss the annual Vineyards of Hampshire Fizz Fest on 24th July at Black Chalk, with special guest, TV Wine Expert, best-selling author & Hampshire resident, Helen McGinn.

Sample over twenty different sparkling and still wines, plus live entertainment, masterclasses and food stalls.





The beauty of having such wonderful landscapes means that Test Valley offers the perfect rural retreat for countryside lovers. Whether you are a serious rambler or a seasonal ambler - there are open spaces to explore and enjoy.

Walking is the ideal way to take in Test Valley's beautiful villages. With chalk downs and wooded hills of the North Wessex Downs as their backdrop, the countryside is connected by hundreds of miles of public rights of way. Each walk takes on a new identity depending on the season, from the new spring flowers to autumnal colours. Rest assured there will be stunning views and sites to see whatever time of year you are enjoying a Test Valley amble.

RECOMMENDED WALKS!

Starting at The Lights theatre in Andover, this circular walk follows footpaths to the stunning setting of Anton Lakes Local Nature Reserve - the source of the River Anton. Ideal for those with a love of flora and fauna, its natural beauty is simply breathtaking - water meadows, cattle-grazed grass chalkland and fields of watercress.

In spring watch out for new life and vibrant colours.

Ladies Walk offers great views across Andover. The path forms part of the pre-Roman track known as the Mark Way where 121 trees were planted to commemorate the wedding of His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales - who later became King Edward VII - to Princess Alexandra of Denmark in 1863. Of the original trees, horse chestnut, beech, oak and sycamore still remain and bring stunning autumn colours in the fall.

Wherwell near Stockbridge has to be one of the most attractive villages in Test Valley, with a large number of thatched properties. This easy, four-mile walk reveals a village which was once renowned for its Abbey, relics of which can still be seen alongside the present Victorian Church. Make sure you take your camera, it really is a picture-perfect village, with a wintery backdrop it's a Christmas card waiting to happen. Look out for the child and dog-friendly White Lion pub built in 1611.

If you love nothing more than sharing adventures with your dog, then you'll love the abundance of dog-friendly places to visit in Test Valley. From long walks to cosy country pubs, don't let your best friend miss any of the fun!

You'll both love visiting dog-friendly Houghton Lodge Gardens near Stockbridge and exploring the stunning grounds, and Mottisfont is another dog-friendly attraction that welcomes your four-legged friend on a short lead around the gardens as well as a six-mile walking route around the estate.

Just a 15-minute walk (or 3-minute drive) from Mottisfont visitor car park lies Spearywell Wood. This is a National Trust owned woodland on the Mottisfont estate. You and your pup can enjoy a lead-free walk around the 1.5-mile circular walk, marked out with concrete markers.

Walking with your dog is the ideal way to take in Test Valley's beautiful villages. With chalk downs and wooded hills of the North Wessex Downs as their backdrop, the countryside is connected by hundreds of miles of public rights of way. Each walk takes on a new identity



Lying at the heart of Test Valley,
Stockbridge's picturesque Georgian High
Street reflects its early role on a drovers'
road where it was common to see flocks of
sheep or herds of cattle being driven through
the town en route from Wales. Look for the
Drovers House and you can still spot a
sign in Welsh.

Today, Stockbridge High Street offers a wide variety of shops from an art gallery, interior design studio and boutiques to specialist food shops, including a fishmonger, greengrocer and butcher.

Tearooms, pubs and hotels offer local fare to suit every taste. Stockbridge's link with the River Test, and in particular the brown trout, is celebrated at the Trout 'n About festival, which takes place in August. Voted Britain's Best Foodie Street, local produce is all part of the visitor experience, be it beer from nearby Hurstbourne Tarrant, trout from the River Test or buffalo burgers from Broughton Down.

Andover owes much of its character to its prominence as an important 18th century coaching town, with many of the buildings maintaining their charming style and features from this period. Most notable among these are

the imposing Grade II listed Georgian Guildhall and the Star and Garter Hotel.

Modern day Andover has a compact and bustling town centre, with a very pleasant pedestrian environment boasting more than 250 retailers, from high street favourites to an array of specialist independent shops and boutiques.

The town has a fantastic street scene with more than 30 pubs, restaurants, café's and coffee shops, some of which sit alongside the tranquil River Anton as it weaves through the town centre. The range of boutique coffee shops, appetizing restaurants, traditional hostelries and tempting eateries make it the ideal place to relax and meet with friends.

With a twice-weekly market, a monthly Artisan Market, regular events, annual carnival and many other activities, Andover has a real buzz throughout the year.

Conveniently located off the A303, the town has great road links to the M3 and M4 motorways and a direct fast rail link to central London. The town centre is also served by more than 2,000 car parking spaces and plays host to Andover Leisure Centre, The Lights Theatre, Chantry Centre shopping mall and The Museum of the Iron Age.
