#### **GANGER FARM** TO OPEN UP

A fantastic new multi-million-pound sports and leisure complex in Romsey is set to open its doors this summer.

Ganger Farm sports facilities, based at the King's Chase housing development, will soon be passed over to Test Valley Borough Council by Barrett David Wilson Homes.

The council first identified the need for the site in the Local Plan more than ten years ago. Following a planning application for 275 houses on the former fruit farm, the council secured the provision of state-of-the-art community sports facilities through a Section 106 agreement.

The complex comprises of six grass pitches for adult rugby and football and junior football, as well as two floodlit all-weather pitches for hockey, rugby and football. There is a two-storey pavilion with bar and café space, kitchen and balconies overlooking the pitches as well as an exercise and dance studio. The site also includes a large community space, conference room and multiple changing rooms.

Final inspections of the artificial pitches are currently underway, and sports clubs from around the area have already registered their interest and excitement to start using the facility. The grass pitches have already been inspected by the Grounds Maintenance Authority and were commended for their high quality.

Community and leisure portfolio holder, councillor lan Jeffrey, said:

"These are superb facilities that have has been many years in the planning.

"Work has already taken place with the various sports clubs who I know are just as excited as I am to see the facilities in action. While we would like to have an exact date for the opening the current pandemic has meant that there have been some delays, but we're working hard to open the doors for a much needed summer of sport."

#### **RIVERSIDE PARK** NEARS COMPLETION



Andover residents can look forward to their new Riverside Park opening soon as the Town Mills redevelopment enters the final stages of work.

Last month saw 11 new trees planted in the town centre park, each possessing a different quality and providing beautiful blooms during all seasons. The trees will add height and depth to the space, whilst offering plenty of shady spots in the summer months and the new greenery will bring an air of peace and tranquillity to the centre of Andover.

The idea to transform the Town Mills area first came to light in 2017, when a desire to improve the route through the centre of Andover and showcase the river identified Town Mills as a key location that could be developed to achieve this. The area has historically been a place where people have stopped to view the river, though restricted space has made it difficult for pedestrians to pass by.

The new Riverside Park will have dedicated stopping places and a number of new benches have been installed. The development of a section of the car park outside Town Mills will also help to widen the green space that will soon be available to the public.

The park will offer a relaxing spot for people to play, picnic and enjoy the river.

A new footpath and cycleway has been designed to gently wind between the north and south of the park and circular seating areas have been positioned to carefully interject into the pathway to encourage fluid travel through the area.

The development marks the start of the overall transformation of Andover town centre, following the launch of the town centre masterplan which was presented to the public last year. The redevelopment of the area surrounding Town Mills is a joint project between Test Valley Borough Council, Hampshire County Council and Andover Vision and has received more than half a million pounds in funding from the EM3 Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP).



Leader of Test Valley Borough Council, Councillor Phil North, said:

"After a difficult year, we're now incredibly close to seeing this project reach completion. Everyone has been working so hard to develop the area and create something truly special for Andover. With spring just around the corner and the roadmap for the lifting of restrictions announced, it will be a perfect time for us all to make the most of the new park and really embrace all that Andover has to offer."



# NEW EXTRA CARE HOMES TO OPEN THIS SUMMER



New homes for older people in Romsey are nearing completion following a partnership between Hampshire County Council (HCC), Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) and Places for People.

Nightingale Lodge, based on the corner of Winchester Road and Cupernham Lane, is due to open this summer and offers extra care accommodation and 24-hour care and support on site. The development is aimed at people who have either existing care or support needs, or who anticipate needing support in the near future.

Thirty-seven of the apartments will be made available for affordable rent and 17 will be available for purchase through a shared ownership scheme.



#### PUSHING FORWARD ON CLIMATE CHANGE



Test Valley Borough Council is continuing to push on to help combat climate change, following the declaration of a climate emergency in September 2019.

A number of projects have seen the authority reduce its electricity output and save hundreds of thousands of pounds on paper, having cut down on printing. Significant reductions in light electricity at the Chantry Centre car park following the installation of LED lighting last year is just one way the council is looking to cut back and save further.

Other changes include the council adding electric vehicles to the authority's fleet to replace diesel versions.

As well as reducing carbon output, the council is also looking at different ways to manage parts of the borough's green spaces in a bid to increase wildlife while reducing the emissions that are usually produced.

Businesses have also benefitted, with the council helping organisations in the borough to access grants to help towards the cost of delivering projects such as energy-saving initiatives and installing renewable energy systems, as well as accessing free energy audits.

## **SUPPORT STILL AVAILABLE**FOR BUSINESSES DURING LOCKDOWN



Businesses are being encouraged to apply for thousands of pounds of vital funding to help the local economy that has been impacted by national restrictions.

The covid-19 pandemic has meant that many businesses are currently closed in an effort to reduce transmission of the disease. However, businesses are being encouraged to come forward to apply for a number of grants that remain available.

Since January, having received national guidance from the government on eligibility and other criteria, Test Valley Borough Council's revenues team has been processing hundreds of thousands of pounds to award businesses across the borough.

The authority has paid out around £9m in grants to businesses since the November lockdown, around £9m has been paid out in grants to businesses. Despite the significant amount, those who haven't already come forward are being asked to do so, particularly in the retail, hospitality and leisure sectors, as well as those in events and who have had to close as a direct result of the lockdown.

Support also remains available to those in the early years childcare sector through the Additional Restrictions Grant (ARG).

All businesses that remain eligible for support will automatically be paid for the period up to March 31, following the recent roadmap announcement by central government.

The schemes available include the ARG, the Local Restrictions Support Grant and new lockdown grants with one-off payments to closed or affected businesses.

The ARG covers businesses in the retail, hospitality, leisure, events and

early learning sectors and will last for the duration of any national lockdown, as well as tier four limitations. This grant also covers supply chains that have not been forced to close, but whose income has been significantly affected by the closure of its customers.

The Local Restrictions Support Grant (addendum) applies to retail, hospitality and leisure businesses mandated to close during the tier four restrictions and national lockdown.

Payments for both the ARG and Local Restrictions Grant range from £1,000 to £4,500 depending on the applicable restrictions and rateable value.

Lockdown grants will supply a oneoff payment to businesses who have
been forced to close or affected by
the national lockdown that began in
January, but businesses will only be
eligible if they pay business rates.
Covering similar sectors, payments
can range up to £9,000. These grants
will be paid automatically to eligible
businesses that receive the above ARG
and Local Restrictions Grant payment.

Finance portfolio holder, councillor Maureen Flood, said:

"I'm extremely pleased that such a large sum of funding has been passed to those who really need it in our Test Valley economy. However, there remain opportunities for those who may be eligible to apply, and I really hope that businesses and organisations take up that chance.

"Although the vaccination programme is rapidly helping to make our communities safer, we are not out of the woods yet by any stretch and this is a real chance to help our businesses. I would urge those who haven't yet, to come forward."

# FIRST-OF-ITS-KIND OFFICE SPACE APPROVED FOR ANDOVER

Andover is set to benefit from the creation of first-of-its-kind office space after Test Valley Borough Council received grant backing for a modern, vibrant, co-working facility, right in the heart of the town centre.

The council is working with IncuHive Group Limited to create a new 'IncuHive Space' on the fourth and fifth floors of Chantry House and has just secured more than £200k in grant funding from the M3 Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) to deliver the project.

IncuHive Spaces offer business incubation and co-working centres with a creative twist, providing mentoring, investment, office space, networking and more – all with the aim of creating a diverse business community. This exciting new facility will be aimed at small businesses, start-ups and for people currently working from home. It reflects a need for flexible space in town centres, both in the short-term as they begin to emerge from lockdown and in the longer-term as the nation's high streets continue to evolve and adapt.

It is expected to reduce the need for office workers to undertake long commutes by providing equally well-equipped and better located accommodation, avoiding the need to travel to major cities. The proposal from IncuHive will see the refurbishment of more than 4,700 sq ft of commercial floorspace to create six individual office spaces and 30 rentable desks, together with a recreation area and reception facilities.

It is also hoped that the new facility will assist with the town's economic recovery and drive up footfall in the High Street.

The move will mark the start of the journey towards a new era for Andover, which will see a greater mixture of work, living and leisure uses in the town centre.

The project is expected to take around five to six months to complete, with work set to begin in the coming weeks.

The proposal has been designed to comply with social distancing rules, and the council and IncuHive will put in place various precautions to safeguard users. In providing a local facility as an alternative to commuting to London, it will reduce the strain on public transport and assist with carbon reduction.

# COUNCIL TAX SUPPORT UNCHANGED IN FACE OF PANDEMIC

Residents will continue to receive the same level of council tax support after Test Valley borough councillors voted in January to maintain the existing scheme due to the impact of the pandemic.

Council tax support provides a contribution towards council tax bills for households with a low income and for those with limited savings who cannot work. The amount awarded by the authority can cover up to 100 per cent of the amount owed.

Anyone who has a liability to pay council tax in the UK can apply for council tax support but entitlement will depend on their family circumstances and how much income and capital they have.

Finance portfolio holder, councillor Maureen Flood, said:

"As well as the impact on people's health, the impact of coronavirus on businesses and their employees has caused many people financial hardship. The council tax support scheme offers vital help to the most vulnerable members of our community and this has never been more important."

### **HELPING TO TEST THOUSANDS**WITH ANDOVER FACILITY



Test Valley Borough Council's Shepherds Spring Lane car park is currently helping to test thousands across the county as part of the efforts against the spread of coronavirus.

The walk-through testing facility opened in January and is open for those with symptoms to book appointments, as part of the Government's UK-wide drive to continue to improve the accessibility of coronavirus testing for local communities.

Testing is available only for those with coronavirus symptoms – a high temperature, a new, continuous cough, or a loss or change to sense of smell or taste. Anyone with one or more of these symptoms should book a test via the NHS website, or by calling 119. From the start of the pandemic, testing has been prioritised for the most vulnerable, including patients in clinical settings and care home residents, vital health and care staff and to manage outbreaks.

The site is situated to enable easy access for those on foot, but spaces remain available for those who need to drive. Those being tested are required to follow public health measures, including social distancing, not travelling by taxi or public transport, practising good personal hygiene and wearing a face covering throughout, including while travelling to and from the testing centre.

Anyone attending an appointment at a walk-through testing site will be provided with guidance on getting to and from the test site safely, with additional support for vulnerable groups and people with disabilities.

Appointments are made available each day.

The site is part of the largest network of diagnostic testing facilities created in British history, which now comprises drive-through sites, walk-through sites, mobile units, home testing and satellite kits and five mega laboratories.

Anyone testing positive for the virus in England will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace to help them track their contacts. This will help people to identify anyone they may have been in close contact with, protecting others from further transmission.

Close contacts of those testing positive will also hear from NHS Test and Trace, asking them to stay at home for 14 days to prevent them from unknowingly spreading the virus. They will be advised to also book a test if they develop symptoms.

Leader of Test Valley Borough Council, councillor Phil North, said:

"Vaccinations and mass testing are both absolutely pivotal in enabling us to navigate our way out of this pandemic. Having provided council-owned buildings to our NHS colleagues for the vaccination centres, I'm really pleased that we've also been able to provide this car park as a testing facility – which will enable users to both walk-up and drive to the site. Making it much easier for local residents to get a test.

"While another national lockdown is tough to take, there is light at the end of the tunnel if we all pull together and do the right thing. If you have any symptoms of coronavirus, then please do get tested and don't risk passing it to your loved ones or others around you."

# CURTAINS UP FOR VACCINATION CENTRES

The Lights theatre in Andover and Crosfield Hall in Romsey have seen thousands vaccinated against coronavirus after opening their doors as GP-led vaccination sites to assist with the rollout of the national vaccination programme just before Christmas.

Council chiefs continue to work with NHS colleagues from the West Hampshire and North Hampshire Clinical Commissioning Groups after initially trying to identify suitable sites in the borough, with The Lights in Andover and Crosfield Hall in Romsey both selected for the mammoth task.

The national vaccination programme is being coordinated by the NHS and central government with those most at risk receiving their initial doses of the breakthrough vaccine, first. The NHS will contact people in the priority groups when it is their turn to receive the vaccine. People should not contact their surgeries as the vaccination service is available strictly by invitation only.

Leader of Test Valley Borough Council, councillor Phil North, said:

"I am really pleased that we are able to play our own small part in supporting the national vaccination programme. We apologise for any inconvenience this may cause to the users of these venues but the scale of this task is almost unprecedented and we will do all we can to assist the NHS with the rollout of the vaccines."

Dr Ben Sharpe, clinical lead for the Andover vaccination site, said:

"The scientists behind this vaccine have managed to ensure it is safe, well-tested and very effective in a brilliantly short timescale.

"There has been extraordinary teamwork across the town amongst the Primary Care Network (all of the town's GP practices together), Test Valley Borough Council, the team at The Lights and the Clinical Commissioning Group in Hampshire. There has been an amazing response of over 200 volunteers wanting to help us deliver this programme, for which we are really grateful."

### COMMUNITY TESTING SITE KICKS OFF AT PICKET TWENTY SPORTS PAVILION

The sports pavilion at Picket Twenty has been unveiled as a community testing site for eligible residents without coronavirus symptoms.

Launched last month, the Test Valley Borough Council sports pavilion is being run until at least April and is one of 11 community testing sites across Hampshire.

The appointment-only scheme, which was initially launched to run for six weeks and is being delivered by Hampshire County Council in partnership with the Department of Health and Social Care and local district councils, is aimed at Hampshire residents who travel regularly outside their home for work and who are not covered by an existing workplace testing scheme.

The Picket Twenty site is only for those who are asymptomatic. Anyone experiencing symptoms, and anyone with a high temperature, a new, continuous cough, or a loss or change to their sense of smell or taste should book a test at nhs.uk/coronavirus or by calling 119.



Leader of Test Valley Borough Council, councillor Phil North, said: "Getting this site ready as a community testing facility has been no mean feat and I am really pleased that we have been instrumental in bringing this forward. Although it would have been ideal to get this in place prior to now it's inevitable that these things take time to be approved from the centre, so I cannot thank the staff at Test Valley **Borough Council and Hampshire** County Council enough for the huge amount of work they have undertaken to turn this around as quickly as possible.

"Effective testing and, of course, the phenomenal vaccination programme, offer light at the end of the tunnel, and we will do everything we can to support our NHS and public health colleagues to deliver those."

## COUNCIL SETS OUT BUDGET STRATEGY IN WAKE OF PANDEMIC

Test Valley Borough Council chiefs have set their budget strategy for 2021/22, after outlining their plans to navigate the financial challenges brought about by coronavirus.

At a full council meeting last month, councillors addressed the loss of income due to the pandemic, primarily from car parking, planning application and leisure centre fees, combined with increased costs, which means the authority is expected to be £6.3m worse off in 2020/21. But thanks to various government grants and savings, the total deficit for the year is £1.4m. To deal with this gap, the council's cabinet agreed to dip into reserves to cover the deficit once final figures are revealed in May.

Councillors also recognised that
Covid-19 is going to have a profound
impact on Test Valley's budget for
2021/22. The government is assuming
that the authority will put up council tax
by £5 next year to help pay
for that and has already built that into
its assessment of councils'
spending power.

In order to close the budget gap for next year, the cabinet has decided to make a further draw on reserves coupled with a much more modest council tax increase of £2.50.

Finance portfolio holder, councillor Maureen Flood, said:

"The past year has been incredibly challenging for everyone including the council, but we are fortunate that we have been able to continue providing our core services throughout the pandemic. It is crucial that we continue to protect those services but acknowledge that there will be difficult times ahead and we will face various financial pressures for a great deal of time to come.

"Thanks to our reserves and support from central government we have been able cushion the blow for this year. Reserves do not offer an unlimited resource and we are only able to spend that money once, but there has never been a more important time for us to dip into those funds.

"In 2021/22, Test Valley residents will pay an average of £148.91 for the year, covering a range of services including bin collections, housing and homelessness, planning, licensing, economic development and leisure, as well as the delivery of major projects such as the redevelopment of Andover and Romsey town centres. After the increase, Test Valley's council tax will remain one of the lowest in Hampshire."

The authority recently announced that its council tax support scheme to help those on low incomes would remain unchanged.

### PUBLIC ASKED FOR BEST WAYS TO HAVE THEIR SAY AS NHS PROGRAMME MOVES FORWARD

People across Test Valley,
Hampshire and the wider
areas are being asked how
they would like to receive
information and provide
feedback on potential changes
to hospital services.

The results will inform public consultation plans for the Hampshire Together: Modernising our Hospitals and Health Services programme, which is expected to consult on proposals for change later this year.

The Hampshire Together programme was set up in response to the New Hospital Programme as part of the Government's Health Infrastructure Plan, which named north and mid Hampshire as one of the areas to benefit from funding to build 40 new facilities before 2030.

It includes the potential for the construction of a brand-new hospital, with health and care partners working together to develop health, wellbeing and care services, that provide everyone across north and mid Hampshire with access to high-quality, timely and sustainable hospital services as close to home as possible. "It's really important we make information about our proposals as widely available and as accessible as we can," said Alex Whitfield, chief executive of Hampshire Hospitals, which runs Andover War Memorial Hospital, Basingstoke and North Hampshire Hospital and Royal Hampshire County Hospital, in Winchester.

"We know that people like to receive and respond to information in different ways, whether that is via leaflets and videos or public meetings and drop-in exhibitions. Getting a sense of people's preferences will help us to tailor the range of information and activities we offer during our consultation. This is particularly important during the COVID-19 pandemic as we find our normal ways of receiving information and engaging in our local communities are different."

#### **TAKING THE FIGHT TO THOSE RESPONSIBLE** IN TEST VALLEY

**Test Valley Borough Council has secured a** number of successful prosecutions against those who continue to commit fly-tipping and waste crimes across the borough.

In January, Mitchell Cooper was made to pay almost £23,000 for a series of offences that took place last year, including not having the correct licences, fly-tipping waste and rubble, and failing to explain how he disposed of more than 50 tyres he was seen carrying.

February saw two sisters ordered to pay more than £1,500 between them for failing to attend a formal interview after waste belonging to them was found in two car parks. Carla Matthews was fined regarding the fly-tip in a Test Way car park between Timsbury and King's Somborne, while her sister

Chantell was fined regarding waste in Cowdown Lane, Andover.

Also earlier this year, Max Stevenson, of no fixed address, was prosecuted after he had been driving his truck around the area between January and April 2020, and was collecting and disposing of scrap metal. However, when officers from Test Valley Borough Council started the investigation and asked for Mr Stevenson to produce his licences, no response was ever given.

Mr Stevenson was fined £300, ordered to pay a £34 victim surcharge, and costs of £1,123, bringing the total financial costs to £1,457.





"This investigation goes to show that we will ask to see the correct documentation to ensure that the right laws are being followed, and it also enforces the fact that we will seek to prosecute if we believe it's the right course of action. I would ask that everyone who is employing somebody to handle or dispose of their waste, checks that they are licenced via the Environment Agency."

#### **COMMISSION AWARD** FOR ROMSEY PUBLIC ARTWORK

**Test Valley Borough Council** (TVBC) has awarded a public art commission for Abbotswood, Romsey to Thrussells, a father and son creative art practice.

Thrussells Metal Sculptors specialise in community public art and create high quality work depicting heritage and natural history subjects made from mild steel, cor-ten, copper and stainless steel. All their work is created with their belief that public art can be for all to enjoy by creating installations with interpretation, durability, longevity, tactility and a passion for heritage and nature.

For Abbotswood, they have proposed a comprehensive sculptural trail that guides walkers around the development, highlighting key points of interest with sculptural storytelling and symbology. The project will include ten urban pointer way-markers located across the Abbotswood development at key intersections, creating a trail and directions. Four sculptural way-markers will be slightly bigger with additional detail and coloured glass. These sculptural way-markers would be located at the entry points to Abbotswood, the nature conservation area entries and the community facilities such as the community centre and play area.

The installation will also feature two sculptures to enhance the urban green spaces.

The £56,000 funding for these commissions comes directly from Section 106 developer contributions specifically set aside for public art at Abbotswood.

Artist, Thomas Thrussell said: "This trail will take residents on a journey through time and space providing hints to the rich environment that we live in. We are delighted to have been appointed for this unique opportunity to go on a creative and inspiring journey with Abbotswood community, and are excited to bring this trail to reality with the help of the local people."

Thrussells will begin the project with a community engagement programme that aims to reach all residents and stakeholders through research, walks, talks, workshops, exhibition activities and social media. More information on how residents and communities can get involved will be shared as soon as Covid-restrictions allow.

Community and leisure portfolio holder, councillor Ian Jeffrey said: "This project will give the local community and stakeholders the chance to play a key role in the development of their neighbourhood. It is a prime example of how public art can be a catalyst for people to become involved and invested in their surroundings, and to care about the environment in which they live."

# CENSUS DAY IS HERE



it's about us Census 2021

With March 21 literally around the corner, Census 2021 is in full swing in Test Valley.

The letters, with unique access codes, have all gone out and responses are already coming in.

The census is a survey that occurs every ten years and helps to record official trustworthy data for people and households in England and Wales via the Office for National Statistics (ONS). This year, the survey is going digital and takes around ten minutes per person to take part.

The questionnaire includes questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces. For those aged 16 and over there are also new, voluntary questions on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

The information helps to form policy and decisions in both national and local organisations, including Test Valley Borough Council. Previous census information has contributed towards planning for the redevelopment of the town centres, and the Corporate Plan for the next few years.

Operating in line with the government's latest Covid-19 guidance, field officers

will be deployed across the country to contact those who have not responded. They will offer help and advice to those who need it. They will also remind people that their census response is required by law.

This census is the most inclusive yet. Everyone can identify as they wish using search as you type online and write-in options on paper if they need it.

The questionnaire includes questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces. For those aged 16 and over there are also new, voluntary questions on sexual orientation and gender identity.

"A successful census will help give the best picture of the needs of everyone living in England and Wales. It helps us to understand what our society needs and what it will likely need in the future.

"It takes just ten minutes per person to take part and if you can't get online, there are paper forms available for those who need them. Now is the time to make your mark on history."
