
THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Residents and visitors will soon be able to enjoy even more of the Borough's unique wildlife as Fishlake Meadows receives a major enhancement.

The 60-hectare local nature reserve near Romsey is home to a large and diverse selection of wildlife including water vole, otter, dragonfly, damselfly and more than 150 species of bird. The site boasts an unusual combination of open and standing water, reed bed and swamp which create an array of unique habitats rarely seen elsewhere in our chalk river valleys.

The reserve's bright future is thanks to a new partnership between Test Valley Borough Council and the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust. The Trust was awarded the contract after it successfully bid for the project earlier this year.





Priorities for the site include maintaining the diverse range of species of flora and fauna, improving visitor access and developing opportunities for the community to view and understand the wildlife. Officers from the Trust are already engaging with local residents to find out what they would like to see and to share information about the project.

One of the biggest improvements to the site will be the improved public access. The Trust will carefully manage the balance between encouraging wildlife to flourish and allowing visitors to enjoy the natural beauty. Initial ideas include repairing the surface of the canal path, increasing accessibility for lowmobility users, creating new walking routes and installing better infrastructure such as boardwalks and hides.

ANDOVER VISION

After a year of consultation with residents, businesses, schools and community groups, Andover now has a document which will set out how the town will become an even better place to live.

An Andover Town Centre that offers a unique experience and showcases its retail, leisure and heritage offer from day into evening.

To support jobs, businesses and skills: An enterprising Andover that builds on its great location which encourages business and new talent to

start, grow and flourish.

To ensure access to great health:

An Andover where people live well and are able to make good lifestyle choices, with access to high quality facilities, support and information.

Throughout the summer, the Andover Vision team attended a variety of events including Augusta Park's 2nd birthday celebration, Harrow Way School's 50th anniversary fete, the Andover Carnival and the Four Fun Fridays events.

The Andover Vision partnership is currently in the process of finalising the action plan which will support the five ambitions. Current projects include increasing access to the countryside and time banking, where people who voluntarily give up their time to help someone can reclaim help from someone else at a later date.

The Andover Vision partnership has already facilitated the installation of two free outdoor table tennis tables, the vinyl artwork at the Dragon Garden restaurant on Bridge Street and the High Street arches.

BUSINESSES MAKE THEIR FACILITIES AVAILABLE

Andover's Community Toilet Scheme officially began in July with three town centre businesses pledging to make their facilities available to the public.

Costa, Caffé Nero and The Redbridge have all signed up to support the Council's commitment to providing public toilets free of charge. With Costa open from 7am and The Redbridge open until 11pm, the hours of operation have increased substantially from the 8am to 6pm that the public toilets

at George Yard were open.

The three eateries have each displayed a sticker in their window to show that they are part of the scheme. Maps in the town centre car parks show where the participating businesses, and additional public toilets in the Chantry Centre, can be found.

Similar schemes have been successful in other towns where participating businesses have reported increased footfall and trade as a result of signing up.

A BID TO BECOME A BID

Andover's quest to become a
Business Improvement District (BID)
has taken a step further now that
specialist consultant, CMS, has been
appointed to support the scheme.

Following a request from the Andover BID Steering Group, which asked the Council and Secretary of State to arrange a bid ballot, Test Valley Borough Council has invested £50,000 in securing the expert guidance from CMS. With experience in establishing

many other BIDs across the country, CMS will carry out the ballot process and work with town centre businesses to progress the initiative.

A BID is led and funded by businesses that would oversee town centre management within a defined area. The revenue generated by the initiative will be invested in activities and services which are decided by participating organisations to promote the town centre and its businesses.

ARCHES LEAD THE WAY



Shoppers won't be able to miss more opportunities to explore Andover's retailers now that three bright and colourful new arches have been installed in the High Street.

Shops and businesses located at George Yard, Union Street and Globe Yard are all benefiting from prominent new entrances that direct visitors to their premises. Arches are also planned for Black Swan Yard, Kings Yard, Shaws Walk and Waterloo Court.

The striking wrought iron arch at George Yard has an elaborate framework that complements the traditional exterior of The George Inn public house next door. Union Street's new curvy structure reaches into the alleyway itself, and the newest addition to the High Street, the Globe Yard arch, has a textured green fascia that sits above a curved framework.

BID TO MAKE TOWN MAKATON-FRIENDLY



Our staff have supported a bid to make Romsey a Makaton-friendly town by learning how to communicate using a language programme made up of signs and symbols.

At least ten of our staff have learned Makaton signs that make it easier to communicate with vulnerable members of the community. The programme consists of gestures that are used alongside the spoken word.

Civil Enforcement Officers and Customer Services Officers attended the training, which also included representatives from other public service bodies. Hannah Anderson, representing Speaking Space which is spearheading the campaign, led the session and taught useful phrases such as *hello*, *take a seat*, *my name is* and *can I help?* She said:

"If everyone could learn 30 signs and symbols, we can make such a difference to the lives of those who would otherwise be in isolation due to their difficulties in communicating and being understood. This initiative is creating opportunities for people to increase their confidence and independence. It's going to be life-changing."

WE REACHED THE FINALS!



We were thrilled to reach the final of the Local Authority of the Year category in the MJ Local Government Achievement Awards this summer.

There were 400 submissions in total for the 14 categories and we were the only district council to reach the final six in our category.

To reach the final, we demonstrated that councillors and senior management had a clear vision, strong plans for the future and evidence of successful service provision. We highlighted the way the authority is helping communities to develop through initiatives such as Romsey Future and Andover Vision, which have enabled councillors to engage better with local people.

Using innovative technology to enable residents to interact better with us was also central to the application.

Our entrepreneurial nature, which ensured we have a sound financial footing and were able to avert the need to reduce frontline services, also set the bid apart.

The judging panel said:

"Test Valley's submission demonstrated it is pushing the boundaries by going above and beyond in providing innovative, excellent services for its residents and businesses."

Our submission included examples of engaging with residents, investing in local communities and demonstrating how we have delivered on our promises. This success follows the news that we reached shortlisting stage in the LGC Awards in its Driving Efficiency Through Technology category earlier in the year.

TEN YEARS OF **GREEN FLAGS**

Romsey War Memorial Park, Valley Park Woodlands Local Nature Reserve and Rooksbury Mill Local Nature Reserve have again been recognised by the Green Flag Award Scheme as amazing green spaces, thanks to the hard work of Test Valley Borough Council's staff working within the local community.

For the parks to be awarded
Green Flags, Countryside Officers
must demonstrate proficiency in
horticulture, expertise in ecology
and evidence of working to the
highest standards of health and
safety. Each park or open space has
a comprehensive management plan
which includes routine tasks such as

tree inspections, play park checks and general maintenance, with long term plans for improvements.

The beautifully-kept Romsey War Memorial Park is celebrating a decade of consecutive Green Flags while Rooksbury Mill in Andover was awarded its ninth, and Valley Park its eighth.

REDUCING HOMELESSNESS

Our Housing Options team prevented around 427 households from becoming homeless in 2016/17.

The team's efforts have been recognised by the National Practitioner Support Service, which has awarded the authority the Silver Standard for preventing homelessness. The award sets 10 different 'challenges', with each one designed to help local authorities to deliver more efficient and cost-effective homelessness services.

The Federation has cited the authority's grants, networking opportunities, skills support and access to specialists as just some of the ways in which the Council has helped entrepreneurs and small business owners to launch their exciting new ventures.

We have won the award for six years, despite being up against strong competition from other Hampshire authorities.

COMPUTER CAFÉS BRING IT SUPPORT



Computer cafés have opened in King's Somborne, Nursling and Rownhams and Ampfield to help residents learn more about using computers, laptops and tablets.

Volunteers across the parishes are offering personalised support on topics such as creating documents, online shopping and using email. The sessions have been hugely popular and seen many participants become more confident in using technology.

Residents are invited to bring their own devices or make use of the small number of laptops available at the sessions. People wishing to volunteer to help at the sessions are also invited to attend if they have basic IT knowledge.

SETTLING IN OVER WALLOP

The picturesque village of Over Wallop is now home to 35 new dwellings, including 14 affordable homes.

Among the affordable homes are four spacious bungalows, built to Life Time Home standard, which are particularly attractive to older residents and anyone with low mobility.

Housing and Environmental Health Portfolio Holder, Councillor Phil Bundy, said: "The Landings is a fantastic development that helps local people to get on the property ladder – something that is notoriously difficult in the current economic climate. I am pleased to see that more young people are now able to settle in the areas in which many of them have lived all their lives and are of course, able to stay in Test Valley."

The National Housing Federation recently announced that it had found strong support for new housing in rural England. Almost two-thirds (65%) of residents living in rural areas supported new homes in their area if they are affordable to local people on average incomes.



FUNDING FOR RURAL BUSINESSES



Rural businesses in Test Valley can apply for funding from the Government's LEADER programme.

LEADER is designed to support rural businesses, including farmers and land owners, in new capital schemes that provide new jobs. To date, nine projects have been supported in Test Valley, including new visitor accommodation at Houghton Lodge, a new cow-milking system at Lamberts Dairy and renovations to a farm shop at Greenfield Pork in Anna Valley (pictured).

WORK BEGINS ON LEISURE FACILITIES



At a time of austerity and budget cuts elsewhere, we are investing over £18 million in a major project as part of our long term plans for the future health and wellbeing of Test Valley residents.

We are excited about the provision of high quality leisure facilities for residents right across the borough. As well as a brand new, state of the art centre for Andover, there will be improvements to Romsey Rapids, Romsey Sports Centre, Knightwood Leisure

Centre and Charlton Lakeside Pavilion. Financially, the new contract is expected to bring significant net revenue benefit to the Council over the 30 year period and as such, will strengthen the Council's overall position in the medium and longer term.

CHARLTON LAKESIDE

An exciting high ropes, low ropes and zip wire scheme has been proposed for Charlton Lakeside.

In addition, the café has been refurbished and work on the lake will begin shortly.

In the meantime, the golf courses and playground continue to be a valued attraction.



ROMSEY RAPIDS

By the end of this year, the gym at Romsey Rapids will have a facelift, including new equipment, new kit and an improved layout. Next year will bring refurbished changing rooms, poolside ceiling, and reception area.

Improvements have already been made behind the scenes to the swimming pool's operational plant.

New group cycling bikes (pictured) have been installed and the studios will be redecorated and revamped in due course



KNIGHTWOOD LEISURE CENTRE



Currently, Knightwood Leisure
Centre has a sports hall, two
football pitches, a cricket square,
basketball court, skating area, tennis
courts, adventure playground,
treatment rooms, a BMX track and a
multipurpose area.

On 4 September, work began to refurbish and upgrade the centre to include a new gym. It is due to open by the end of the year.

During the refurbishment, a flexible meeting space has been created which can be used by local groups including the Knightwood Youth Club.

The football pitches have been excavated and new drainage installed ready for pitches to be in use early next year.

There are plans for a gymnastics club to be launched in the new year.

KNIGHTWOOD PRE-SCHOOL

Children who used a small studio within the Knightwood Leisure Centre complex for their day nursery are now in their brand new bespoke home next to the site. There are activity spaces, a kitchen, offices and an outdoor play area.

The plans were fully funded by Test Valley Borough Council and supported by Hampshire County Council and Valley Park Parish Council as well as local parents. This means there is increased capacity at the Knightwood leisure centre where a new state of the art gym is under construction, offering a more varied programme for local residents.



Carly Dorney and Catherine Botto are co-owners of Knightwood Pre-School. Carly said: "Catherine and I are really excited about our new building and we are very grateful to both Test Valley Borough Council and Hampshire County Council for supporting us." Catherine added: "We have lots of ideas and plans for the new academic year and this is a lovely environment to do this in."

The Pre-School opened at the end of September.

ANDOVER LEISURE CENTRE



The swimming pool and gym are being demolished and the site is being prepared for the new leisure centre in Andover.

Parts of the centre will remain open throughout the disruption including the gym, studios and squash courts as well as Merlin's Kingdom.

We are sorry that people will experience disruption to their sport and leisure activities whilst the building work takes place, but we are doing everything we possibly can to minimise this. This includes ensuring that the centre will not be closed completely, phasing the different aspects of the building

programme, displacing activities to neighbouring facilities where possible and providing temporary swimming provision.

Places for People Leisure will also be investing around £40k into refreshing and rejuvenating the elements of the leisure centre which remain open. This includes new flooring outside of the studios, re-decoration of the studios, a revised entrance to the gym and ceiling works in Merlin's Kingdom.

The new Leisure Centre is scheduled to re-open in Spring 2019, followed by complete demolition of the remaining part of the centre containing the gyms.

A GREAT PLACE TO WORK **AND DO BUSINESS**



Test Valley's employment rate is 6% above the national average, according to the Office of National Statistics.

New figures have revealed that more than 80% of 16 to 64 year olds in Test Valley are employed, compared to 74% across the UK.

And, in the five years from 2010 to 2015, the number of jobs in Test Valley grew by 9,200, or one fifth (19%), from 48,100 to 57,300, compared to the national growth of 7.3%. Among the 13 local authorities in Hampshire, this is the largest rate of growth for this period.

Test Valley is also ranked fourth in new business formation (2010-2016) in Hampshire. We have awarded 23 Independent Retailer Grants (pictured) since the scheme began in 2013 and 40 Business Incentive Grants to small businesses since the value of the grant rose to £750 in 2016. We have committed to presenting a minimum of 20 further Business Incentive Grants to local entrepreneurs by April 2018 and we welcome applications from anyone looking to set up their own organisation.

Economic Development and Tourism Portfolio Holder, Councillor David Drew said:

"This latest set of figures shows that Test Valley continues to provide a healthy business environment that encourages new and existing businesses to invest and develop, which in turn provides more jobs.

"We have a high proportion of our labour force in employment and this looks set to continue as new businesses move onto business parks in Andover and Chilworth. Planning permission has been granted for a 484,000 square foot extension to Walworth Business Park, and the University of Southampton Science Park in Chilworth continues to attract global companies."

ANDOVER SKILLS TRAINING FUND

The Andover Skills Training Fund has helped more than 450 residents enhance their careers by funding qualifications in areas such as customer services and manual handling.

The fund has now supported around 130 businesses to raise productivity by investing in developing the skills of their workforce. It has enabled businesses to generate higher revenue and has helped to create around 100 new jobs.

Phil Rawnson, Managing Director of MRT Castings based at Walworth Business Park, said:

"Over the past five years, MRT Castings have benefited several times from support from the Andover Skills Training Fund. Advanced engineering skills are essential for our business but they are increasingly hard to find in the labour market, so training to develop our existing workforce is essential."

RELIEF FOR **BUSINESSES**

Businesses in Test Valley may be able to benefit from three new Rates Reliefs.

We have been allocated £500,000 from a £300million national funding stream to support businesses that have seen increases in their rates bill from April 2017. Relief will be targeted at small and medium sized businesses that mainly operate in Test Valley.

In addition, the Pub Relief Scheme offers a £1,000 relief to all pubs with a rateable value of less than £100,000. Businesses that have lost small business or rural rate relief due to increases in the 2017 national revaluation exercise will have increases in their bill capped in line with a set formula.

BROWN BINS

Any of these items can be put in your brown bin...

- Paper such as envelopes, catalogues and brochures, but not gift wrap.
- Cardboard such as greetings cards, tubes and boxes.
- Plastic bottles such as fizzy drinks, sauces, cooking oils, cleaning products, shampoo and conditioner bottles.
- Cans and tins such as drinks cans and biscuit or sweet tins.
- Aerosol cans such as whipped cream, hairspray and deodorant.



LOCAL RECYCLING CENTRES

Any of these items can be taken to your local recycling centre...

- Glass bottles and jars such as wines, cordials, mincemeat jars and cranberry sauce jars.
- Textiles such as last year's fashions.
- Aluminium foil such as mince pie cases, roasting trays and takeaway boxes.
- Cartons such as orange juice, custard, sauces and soups.
- Books and media such as CDs, DVDs and video tapes.

It is also a serious offence and the Council investigates every report it receives. Offenders can be fined up to £50,000 and/or receive up to five years imprisonment. Remember, if you arrange to have waste disposed of from your property, you have a duty to check that the company you are using is licenced. This includes companies trading on social media.








ARE YOU **REGISTERED** TO VOTE?





With the European Union Referendum in 2016 and an unexpected General Election earlier this year, recent events have proved the importance of registering to vote and having your say.

If you are not registered, you cannot vote and your voice will not be heard. Not being on the Electoral Register can also affect your credit rating.

Everyone aged 16 or over is responsible for registering themselves, although you cannot vote until you are 18.

To register, visit www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

If you do not have access to the internet or you require support, you can contact us for assistance. As part of your application, you will need to provide your national insurance number and date of birth, along with some other details.

We wrote to all households over the summer to ask them to confirm whether

the information held on the register about their property was correct, and to advise them on what they needed to do should there be any changes to that information. A response is required to this form and residents can do this over the phone, online or by returning the form in the supplied pre-paid reply envelope. Details of the different ways in which a response can be made are provided on the covering letter accompanying the form.


Residents are encouraged to respond to that form as soon as possible if they have not already done so.

If you're not sure if you're registered, please contact us to find out. If you aren't registered, you can do this online or we will send you the forms you need.

If you are unable to get to a polling station on polling day you can apply to vote by post or you can appoint someone else (a proxy) to vote for you.

NEW WARD PATTERN FOR TEST VALLEY



The independent Local Government **Boundary Commission for England has published its final** recommendations for a new pattern of Test Valley Borough Council's electoral wards.

'Ward' is the term used to describe a geographical area whose residents are represented by one or more elected Borough Councillors. The new wards have been produced following two rounds of consultation, to which local residents and county, borough and parish councillors submitted proposals. The new pattern of wards accommodates 43 councillors. In drawing up the wards, the Commission has aimed to deliver electoral equality for voters in council elections so that each councillor represents roughly the same number of voters. They have also sought to ensure the new wards reflect, as far as possible, the interests and identities of communities across Test Valley.

The recommendations for the new wards will now be laid in Parliament, and will come into effect for the local elections in May 2019.

CLADDING CHECK

Following the Grenfell Tower disaster, the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) asked local authorities and Housing Associations to firstly identify all high rise residential buildings that use aluminium cladding materials (ACM), and then submit samples for testing.

In Test Valley, there are no high rise residential buildings that meet the DCLG definition. However, the Government has since requested that local authorities conduct similar checks on all residential buildings that contain either ACM cladding or other cladding systems which have failed combustibility tests, irrespective of whether they are high rise.
